Notes: The FY16 Consolidated Appropriations Bill (P.L. 114-113) redirected \$379 million from the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) to the Violence Against Women (VAWA) programs. This resulted in a reduction of the funding available for VOCA-funded victim services although it provided critical increases to our priority programs. The President's FY17 budget follows the same strategy. VOCA is a non-taxpayer fund consisting of fines and fees paid by criminals. The National Taskforce to End Sexual and Domestic Violence Against Women recommends the VOCA cap be set at a three year rolling average and VAWA programs be appropriated through general funds and not from VOCA. The Taskforce strongly supports a 5% funding stream for tribes and maintaining level funding for the State Assistance Grants.
